



Small Grant Guidelines

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The Small Grants program provides flexible funding for one-time, stand-alone needs up to \$10,000. The program will provide support in two key areas:

1. **Capacity Development** – Helping charities strengthen internal operations, invest in staff training, improve client services, and explore new ways to deliver programs.
2. **Unforeseen Needs** – Offering one-time support for unexpected situations that are independent of ongoing operations and programming.

All funded activities should be planned to conclude within six months of receiving the grant.

ELIGIBILITY FOR SMALL GRANTS

Who can apply?

Applicants must meet **ALL THREE** of the following criteria to apply to the Small Grants Program:

1. Are a [Registered Canadian Charity](#) or other [qualified donee](#)¹.
2. Are based in and/or serve the Greater Edmonton Area, including the four surrounding² counties and Indigenous [qualified donees](#) located within Treaty 6 Territory.
 - National Organizations may apply only if they demonstrate strong local connection, such as sustained operations in the Greater Edmonton Area, locally based staff, and/or local representation on their Board of Directors.
3. Are in good standing with ECF, with no outstanding or overdue final reports, including those from partnership initiatives.

Application limit

Organizations may submit **ONE Small Grant application per calendar year** if they have completed their previously funded initiative and have submitted a final report.

Organizations may also submit **ONE Partnership Small Grant application per calendar year**. See the section below for details.

Priority for equity groups

ECF is committed to equity. As part of our commitment, we will prioritize applications from organizations serving First Nations, Métis and Inuit (FNMI), racialized communities, and other equity groups. We recognize these communities often face systemic barriers to accessing funding.

To advance this commitment, we actively welcome partnership applications from organizations serving First Nations, Métis and Inuit (FNMI), racialized communities, and other equity groups. Other equity groups include those marginalized by systemic barriers, such as First Nations, Métis and Inuit (FNMI), racial or linguistic minorities, 2SLGBTQIA+ communities, and people with disabilities. This list is not exhaustive.

We ask that you connect with a grants team member at grants@ecf.ca if you are looking to apply in partnership with a non-profit organization, before completing an application.

Applying for a Small Grant

Small Grants are available for up to \$10,000. We encourage applicants to request only what they need rather than automatically applying for the maximum amount.

The application period runs from March 1, 2026, to October 1, 2026, or until the allocated budget is fully distributed. Applications are reviewed every two months. Please see the table below for the intakes, funding decision dates and the earliest eligible expenses for each intake period.

Application Intake	Funding Decision	Earliest Date Eligible Expenses Can Be Incurred:

If your request is over \$10,000 or does not meet the Small Grant guidelines, please consider applying to our [Community Grant Program](#) instead.

Examples of eligible Small Grant activities

Sample Capacity Development initiatives could include, but are not limited to:

- Volunteer Program Development – *Example: Create onboarding tools and scheduling systems to improve volunteer engagement.*
- Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Initiatives – *Example: Develop a DEI action plan and update policies to reduce barriers.*
- Learning and Professional Development – *Example: Provide staff training in leadership, grant writing, or specialized skills.*
- Community Engagement & Outreach Strategies – *Example: Launch targeted campaigns and partnerships to reach underserved groups.*
- Digital Transformation – *Example: Upgrade CRM systems, strengthen cybersecurity, and train staff on digital tools.*
- Staff Mental Health and Wellbeing Programs – *Example: Offering Employee Assistance Plan services, wellness workshops, and flexible work options.*
- Fund Development Plans – *Example: Create a fundraising strategy with donor stewardship and digital campaigns.*
- Strengthening a Sector or Collective Group. – *Example: costs for collaboration and organizing, identifying shared issues, and developing collective actions.*

Sample Unforeseen Needs could include, but are not limited to:

- Emergency Facility Repairs – *Example: Fixing a burst pipe or roof leak to prevent program disruption and protect assets.*
- Temporary Relocation Costs – *Example: Renting a short-term space after sudden loss of a primary venue due to fire or flooding.*
- Crucial Technology or Equipment Upgrade – *Example: Replacing a failed server or computer system essential for client data security and program delivery.*
- Emergency Staffing Support – *Example: Hiring short-term staff to maintain essential services during a sudden surge in demand (e.g., disaster response).*
- Health & Safety Compliance – *Example: Upgrades and repairs needed to meet health and safety requirements*
- Accessibility Repairs & Upgrades – *Example: Repairing an elevator or installing temporary ramps.*
- Urgent Legal or Compliance Support – *Example: Hiring a lawyer or consultant to resolve an unexpected regulatory issue that threatens service continuity.*
- Immediate Security Upgrades – *Example: Installing locks or alarm systems after a break-in or incident.*

Small Grants are NOT available for the following:

- Initiatives extending more than 6 months
- Ongoing core operational or programming expenses
- Funding to replace government cuts
- Annual events, conferences or organization celebrations
- Retroactive funding (any expenses incurred prior to the decision date)
- Deficit funding
- Endowments
- Medical equipment
- Research
- Travel outside the Greater Edmonton Area
- Capital campaigns and purchase of land and/or buildings
- Private schools, charter schools, or post-secondary institutions, including their foundations
- Other funders and organizations whose primary purpose is to raise money for a third party
- Grants primarily benefitting individuals (i.e. scholarships, bursaries, gift cards, vouchers, etc.)
- Fundraising events (such as tickets, raffles, auctions, or tournaments) or annual fundraising appeals
- Faith-based organizations and activities that require religious participation by those receiving services or that are providing religious education
- **National or provincial** initiatives without specific benefit to Edmonton; initiatives with a clear and measurable benefit to Edmonton will be considered for a proportional request
 - National Organizations may apply only if they demonstrate strong local connection, such as sustained operations in the Greater Edmonton Area, locally based staff, and/or local representation on their Board of Directors

How to apply

1. Make sure your organization is eligible to apply.
 - a) Review these guidelines carefully. If you need clarification about your organization's eligibility, email grants@ecf.ca to schedule a meeting. Please note, as the deadline approaches, availability is limited.
2. If eligible, complete the application through [our online portal](#), available on ECF's website (See Appendix A of these Guidelines for the application Questions).

How are applications assessed?

The Small Grants program receives a variety of requests. Applications are assessed individually according to the criteria and in relation to the pool of applicants. Assessment can include the following considerations, which vary slightly depending on the type of initiative.

Sample Capacity Development review considerations include:

- Does the request clearly strengthen the organization's long-term capacity?
- Is there a clear plan for implementation and measurable outcomes?
- Has the organization identified how this initiative addresses a current gap or challenge?
- Is the proposed budget reasonable and directly tied to capacity-building activities?
- Does the request have quotes to support work with consultants, training expenses, or professional services, if applicable?
- Will the initiative have lasting impact beyond the grant period?
- Number of Small Grants received over the last number of years.

Sample Unforeseen Needs review considerations include:

- Does the request support a one-time need that is reasonably unanticipated?
- Does the application clearly demonstrate the need for this grant and its benefit to the organization and/or community?
- Is the proposed budget reasonable and directly tied to the unforeseen need?
- Does the request include quotes to support consultants, equipment purchases, or renovations, if applicable?
- Number of Small Grants received over the last number of years.

What grant reporting is required?

Small Grant reports are an online form found on [our online portal](#). The report form will be added to the same user account that submitted the grant application approximately three months after the application has been approved.

The form is comprised of a number of short answer, drop-down menu, and multiple select questions. These questions address general information about your grant, staff resources allocated to your grant, grant impact, financial information, and any follow-up activities which your organization may be undertaking. You will also need to upload financials for the grant which clearly indicate where the grant money was spent. Receipts for expenses are not required.

Direct beneficiaries are individuals who will directly participate in or receive the primary benefits of your project or program e.g. workshop participants, clients served, attendees at an event.

***Why is this specific request important? Tell us about how things are currently, and the proposed changes.**

This could be in relation to clients, your organization, or the broader community.

***When will the initiative start? Include a list of key activities and milestones.**
